





On March 13, 2008, the National Literary Society of the Deaf (NLSD), a reading promotion partner of the Center for the Book, unveiled a new national project at the Library of Congress. It is called "One Book" Reading Promotion Project: Deaf America Reads, 2008 - 2011. Ricardo Lopez, NLSD president said, "This project is a wonderful opportunity for the national deaf community to get together to discuss the same book during the two-year project." The book selected for "One Book" is Moments of Truth: Robert R. Davila, the Story of a Deaf Leader, by three co-authors, Harry G. Lang, Oscar P. Cohen, and Joseph E. Fischgrund. 
